Course Description

This course is a comprehensive and systematic survey of the population, natural resources, geographic regions and potentialities of Africa and the significance of this region in the economic and political affairs of the world. (S and N) (WR)

Prerequisite Knowledge and Skills: There are no course prerequisites.

Purpose of Course

This course presents Geography of Africa from an environmental and economic development perspective. We start by understanding how Africa formed, its landscape, its climates and how people evolved to interact with the environment. There will be a particular focus on wildlife conservation. The course also discusses dynamic issues facing contemporary African societies and the challenges that people and nations of this vast continent are working to resolve, introducing ideas about economic development, politics and governance. Issues of health, demography, gender and culture are also covered. Through lectures, reading assignments, videos and reflective writing exercises, we will study environmental and resource issues, the impact of historical events on development, education and culture, population distribution, social organization, rural and urban structures, industrialization, business and trade, and prospects for the future.

Goals and Objectives

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Identify and describe the physical features, climates, and biomes of Africa;
- 2. Understand how climate shaped human evolution in Africa and the development of civilizations in Africa;
- 3. Explain how external influences and the legacy of colonialism shaped African development (and underdevelopment) and identify development challenges in Africa;
- 4. Describe and analyze human-environment interactions in Africa according to different geographical concepts, and define and identify causes land degradation, including causes & outcomes;
- 5. Describe wildlife policies and concerns, conservation and environmental degradation in Africa;
- 6. Research, outline and write effective essays conveying complex ideas and arguments clearly and precisely, supporting claims with adequate evidence.

Disclaimer: This page and the syllabus represents my current plans and objectives. As we go through the semester, those plans may need to change to enhance the class learning opportunity. Such changes, are likely and will be announced; the most up-to-date requirements will always be posted in the individual module pages.

Lectures/Reading Material:

Students are required to view power point audio lectures and topic videos for each of the course modules.

Additionally, there will be required readings, including assigned chapters from the textbook (The New Scramble for Africa), research articles, and other materials.

Assignments

Module Questions & Answers:

Students will be required to submit 3 questions & answers pertaining to the topics covered in each of the 11 course modules, submitted each week beginning with Week 2/Module 1. Questions submitted by students will create a pool of questions and answers (Q/A) from which the Module Quizzes will in part be created. The questions should be

structured as **multiple choice**, **true/false**, **or short answers**. The Q/A's are required for Modules 1-10 and are worth 5 points per assignment. Completing Q/A's for Module 11 will be extra credit.

Note: Module Q/A's should only be created from information an materials that provided in the course and that everyone has access to. For example, Q/A's should not be portfolio specific or related to topics not covered in the course modules and assigned readings and videos.

Module Quizzes: There will be four (4) module quizzes throughout the semester. The quizzes will consist of 10 questions created by the instructor and derived from the pool of questions created from students' submissions of Module Q/A's.

- Quiz 1: Modules 1-3
- Quiz 2: Modules 4-5
- Quiz 3: Modules 6-8
- Quiz 4: Modules 9-11

Quizzes will be based on the topics and materials covered in the course modules, including audio lectures, assigned journal and textbook chapter readings, and videos provided. The quizzes will be created from a 'question bank' composed of students' submissions of module Q/A's. The course instructor and TA will also contribute questions to the question bank.

Reflection Essays (2) and Activities (3)

Students will be required to write **two Reflection Essays** and complete three Reflection Activities. **Reflection Essay** #1 is a **500-WORD** essay on any previous knowledge or preconceptions you may have about Africa or topics related to Africa, due at the end of Week 1. **Reflection Essay** #2 is a **1,500-WORD** essay on 1-3 topics that you found the most interesting and/or useful in this course, due after completion of Module 11.

Students will be required to complete **three 500-WORD Reflection Activities** as responses to assigned research articles, videos or other materials relative to module topics. These essay activities should demonstrate critical thinking and analysis as you briefly reflect on topics/issues in the African context, and how the issues are relatable on a larger scale.

African Country Portfolio:

- Students will develop a "Portfolio" for an African country of their choice. Students will submit four 500-WORD
 Portfolio Essays and one Annotated Bibliography (Portfolio Submission #1) that will discuss the issues/topics covered in the modules in relation to selected countries.
- By the end of the second week of class, students will select an African country for which they want to develop their Portfolio, which includes conducting preliminary research on the country to determine if there is enough information available through journal/research articles and other scholarly sources that relate to module topics. Students should indicate their selected country by submitting the "Portfolio Country Selection" assignment.
- During the third week of class, students will submit an Annotated Bibliography as Portfolio Submission
 #1 based on their approved African country. Students will provide at least one scholarly source for each of the course modules (you should have 11 sources total) and provide: 1) a brief explanation as to why the source is credible (i.e. qualifies as a 'scholarly source', 2) a short summary of the article (1-2 sentences), 3) brief description of how the article relates to one or more of the module topics.
- The Annotated Bibliography (aka 'Portfolio Submission #1) should be at least 500 WORDS and will serve as a
 resource base for writing the Portfolio Essays (i.e. Portfolio Submissions #2-5) for which scholarly sources are

- required. (Students may find additional or alternative sources throughout the semester if they wish but the bibliography should prepare them for the essays and save time.)
- Scholarly Sources: Scholarly or peer-reviewed journal/research articles are written by scholars, scientists, or professionals who are experts in their fields. In the sciences and social sciences, they often publish research results. Google Scholar is a useful internet search tool, and online digital libraries such as JSTOR (http://www.jstor.org (http://www.jstor.org). You can also access scholarly sources from the UF Library Off Campus Access.
- NOTE: There are a total of 5 required Portfolio Assignments.

What to Expect:

- Online timed exam consisting of 100 fill-in-the-blank, multiple choice & T/F questions drawn from an extensive "question bank" created by the instructors and supplemented from students' submissions of module Q/A's. The questions will be selected via a random process so that each student will have a different set of questions.
- The exam is designed to test your comprehension and understanding of the materials **from the full course**, so all lectures, videos, readings, activities, and other module elements may be covered in the exam.
- The final exam is worth 100 points.
