Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the major themes in human-environment relations that determine how we conserve and utilize the earth's resources. It will cover the importance of conserving resources and assess different conservation strategies. While the themes in this course apply to all natural resources, the class will primarily focus on biodiversity conservation.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the course students will:

- 1. Identify the major threats to natural resources and common conservation strategies
- 2. Practice applying conservation strategies
- 3. Reflect on the feasibility and usefulness of different conservation strategies
- 4. Respectfully debate issues from multiple perspectives
- 5. Examine controversial conservation topics from multiple perspectives
- 6. Critically assess the effectiveness of different approaches to conservation
- 7. Prioritize conservation efforts
- 8. Propose solutions to conservation challenges
- 9. Appraise their own work and the work of their peers
- 10. Develop collaboration skills

Required Materials:

Course components:

Attendance Policy:

Zoom Policy: (for Online Classes only)

Participation in our class is fundamental since improving collaborative skills is a key objective of the course. Thus, students are required to have their cameras on from start to finish during our classes on Zoom. A default setting for our sessions in Zoom is that participants will be muted when they enter, so you will unmute yourself when you comment orally during our whole-group conversations and when you are in small groups. Your instructor may also ask students to reply in the chat box for specific activities. Oral comments on camera and written comments in the chat box are considered activities for participation. If you have technical issues, please immediately consult UF IT Help to resolve them and then contact your instructor. Zoom sessions will not be recorded by the instructor and may not be recorded by students. As in all courses, unauthorized recording and unauthorized sharing of recorded material is prohibited.

Class Participation:

Participation in class activities and discussions is. In-class activities and/or homework may be assigned and will count toward the participation grade. Students will receive a progress report on their participation grade midway through the semester and can request feedback at any point. Specific expectations will be discussed and determined in class and updated to the course policy page in Canvas.

Reflection Journal:

Students will implement conservation strategies into their daily lives and reflect on this experience. Reflection submissions can be submitted in a variety of formats from written documents, videos, brochures, infographics etc.

Quizzes:

For each module students will take a quiz both individually and in teams to assess their preparedness for the class. These quizzes are based on the modules' readings and videos. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Position Paper:

Students must select a conservation challenge that is of interest to them. The topic can be related to material covered in this class or to topics outside of the scope of the course provided it fits within the scope of natural resource conservation. Students will then explore this topic throughout the semester focusing on at least two opposing stakeholder perspectives for the position paper. Deliverables include a topic selection, a draft position paper, peer reviews of classmates, and a final position paper that incorporates peer review feedback. The position paper draft and final will be submitted to Turnitin and any score over 25% will not be graded.

Late policy:

If students have a valid excuse for missing a deadline, this should be communicated to the instructor prior to the due date whenever possible and an extension can be granted. Without a valid excuse, late work may not be accepted. If you have any concerns about deadlines, please speak to the instructor prior to the deadline whenever possible.

Assignments will be graded and returned within 1 week. Please review the graded rubric and submission comments before contacting the instructor about assignment grades.
