**Perusal:** In this course we will be using Perusall, an interactive reading and annotation tool that will help you to better engage with class readings through group annotation. Perusall facilitates a deep reading experience in a learning community by providing an online platform for capturing the comments and questions of peers and the instructor. You are requested to post all comments and other annotations within Perusall as we read. The readings where you should provide your annotations can be accessed through "Perusall" tab on the left-hand side within your course Canvas page.


**Grading and Make-up Policy:** All assignments and due dates are listed on the Canvas e-Learning page. Life happens and therefore there is an automatic grace period of 24 hours for the submission of late assignments with no need to request an extension. However, it is highly recommended that you submit assignments on time when possible because assignments build on one another and it can be hard to catch up if you fall behind. Assignments turned in after the 24 hour grace period will lose 5% for each day of lateness. In this course, grades will assinged on a 100-point scale. #### How are you evaluated?

There are five areas where grades will be issued: reading annotation (Perusal), group presentation, midterm exam, assingments/activities, final project. Each assignment is detailed on Canvas.



Writing Requirement: This course uses writing as a tool to facilitate learning and, as such, it requires four 1,500 word essays to be written throughout the semester (6000 words towards the Writing Requirement, WR). They are to be turned in via the Canvas course website. I will evaluate and provide feedback on written assignments concerning content and critical thinking, grammar, clarity, coherence, and organization.

Grades have two components. To receive WR credit (6000 words), you must receive a grade of C or higher <u>and</u> satisfactory completion of the course writing component.
