## **Course Description**

This course is a comprehensive geographical survey of major economic activities such as agriculture, forestry, fishing, mining, manufacturing and commerce. Emphasis will be upon the study of the characteristics of distribution and the regional patterns of these activities.

## **Course Objectives**

- Understand the genesis, development, and evolution of economic geography as a field
- Obtain an understanding of major forms of economic activity and processes
- Learn to critically analyze economic issues from a geographic standpoint

## **General Requirements**

Requirements for this course include participation in discussions across the ten content units, ten quizzes, a research project, a final exam, and a short review essay.

NOTE: Make-ups cannot be given, except in documented emergencies in which the instructor has been contacted in advance or as soon afterwards as possible. Requests for such exceptions must be submitted in writing, with full explanations and documentation attached. The format of any make-up will be at my discretion. The penalty for work turned in late is 10% of the total possible points per day late. <u>Quizzes</u>, <u>exams</u>, and <u>discussion posts may not be turned in late</u>.

#### **Assessment and Grades**

Due dates for all assignments will be posted on Canvas. You should always refer to the online schedule on our class' Canvas page as that will contain the most up-to-date information.

### Quizzes – 20%

Each unit of class will have a quiz covering the content of the readings, videos, and other materials for that part of the class. Questions will be some combination of multiple-choice, short answer, and fill-in-the-blank questions. Quizzes are timed. Once started, a quiz's time cannot be extended for any reason. All quizzes will be proctored via Honorlock.

## • Final Exam - 10%

As with the quizzes, the questions on the final exam will be some combination of multiple-choice, short answer, and fill-in-the-blank questions. Content will be cumulative, but will be weighted towards material covered in the latter part of class. The exam will be proctored via Honorlock.

#### Discussions – 30% (4000 words)

Each unit of class will have an extended discussion assignment requiring you to engage with the material and your fellow students. These assignments are the primary way we will interact with each other as we consume, digest, and critique the course's material. Discussion posts should be at least 250 words and replies should be at least 125 words, unless otherwise stated in an assignment's instructions.

## • Film Review Essay – 10% (1000 words)

You will write a critical review of the film *Lord of War*. The film focuses on a fictionalized, somewhat fantastic story of an arms dealer. Your critique should examine how well the film presents the realities of the arms trade, and the merits of what it has to say about this illegal/illicit economic activity. The minimum length is 1,000 words.

## • Final Project – 20% (1000 words)

We will complete a final project at the end of the semester. This project will require you to critically analyze the process of globalization as it interacts with and is impacted by other economic activities.

## Participation and Professionalism – 10%

Your participation points reflect your comportment in our online, professional setting. Positive comportment includes asking (or answering) productive questions on the class questions discussion board, being timely with all aspects of the course, informing the instructor of any problems or conflicts you may be having, and being courteous and respectful to all.

Of particular concern in an online setting is email. You should approach all email in this class as a professional, workplace communication. You should therefore follow commonly accepted email etiquette in all communication with your instructional team and classmates.
