My research emphasizes security, mobility, livelihoods, and adaptation among mobile groups like pastoralists in the Sahel region of Africa within human and political geography using political ecology and spatial frameworks.

I am interested in contributing to the scholarship on conflict and security as it relates to marginalized and mobile groups (particularly pastoralists, but also farmers and refugees), specifically in terms of ethnic tensions, borders, migration, governance, extremism, and livelihoods. I use primary and secondary data to examine both impacts of insecurity and adaptation and responses. I teach about population, security, livelihoods, Africa, and mobility.
